Online Graduate Nursing Program Receives Top Ranking in *U.S. News* & World Report

This is the second year *U.S. News* offered a Top Online Education Programs for Higher Education category and the second year Clarkson College applied for and achieved top-ranking status in that sector, this time earning a total of 74.2 out of 75 possible points. *U.S. News* implemented the category last year to give consumers a clearer picture of the growing importance of online education in the college experience and the unique formula necessary to make online degree programs successful.

"Attaining this status is a direct reflection of faculty excellence and administrative support," said Dr. Pat Coyle-Rogers, Director of Graduate Nursing at Clarkson College. "This national recognition of our online MSN programs speaks to the quality of our educational processes, the work ethic of our students and our commitment to the Clarkson College Mission of preparing students to professionally provide high quality, ethical and compassionate health care services."

U.S. News & World Report sent statistical questionnaires to 471 institutions

that granted CCNE (Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education) or NLNAC (National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission) accredited graduate degree programs in Nursing. Among them, 101 (36 percent) said they would be offering an online Master's in Nursing degree program in accordance with *U.S. News* standards.

To measure overall program quality and effectiveness of the online programs, *U.S. News* assessed the following distinct indicators: student engagement and accreditation, student services and technology, faculty credentials and training, and admissions selectivity. The average score of the top 50 colleges and universities that made the rankings was 63.2, 11 points below the score received by Clarkson College.

"Clarkson College is pleased to be ranked among and above such nationally renowned colleges and universities," said Dr. Louis Burgher, President of Clarkson College. "This honor demonstrates our ability to compete at a national level, as well as meet growing industry demands and expectations for future health care professionals."

College Continues to Think Strategically; Leading with Success

The College is humming with activity. In addition to the hard work of offering a quality education to 1,200 students and achieving ranking as the fourth best online Graduate Nursing program in the

nation, we are once again initiating a new strategic plan. This is our annual process that begins with an environmental assessment in December, progresses to an all-campus retreat in January and culminates in a new plan submitted to the Board in March. We score our success against the plan on a quarterly basis, reporting that score to the Board. Virtually all of our new programs, projects and successes are an outgrowth of this process each of the last six years.

I attribute our success to a Mission that is relevant to what we are here for, to the fact that all our staff and faculty provide input (more than 90 serve on this year's planning teams) and the process is transparent to everyone. I take to heart a quote by famous management guru Peter Drucker: "If you

don't know where you are going, any place will do;" and another attributed to Mike Tyson: "Everyone has a plan until they get hit!" Well, we do know where we are, and we hope to not get hit.

Several studies by experts on strategic planning have concluded that around 90 to 95 percent of strategic plans would be regarded as failures, either being unproductive and fruitless or bereft of significant outcomes. The plans that were successful often made all the difference in a company's success. Here at Clarkson College, we plan continuously. We expect our plans to be proactive, to ask the right questions and to be a constant dynamic process. It is my belief that communication of the plan must be continuous and that the president must ultimately be responsible for leading the planning and assessing its outcome

These are some of the reasons as to why we have exceeded a 90 percent goal completion rate in each of our plans over the last six years. Stay tuned, and we will share this year's plan when it is complete.





Student Unexpectedly Meets Biological Grandfather During Nursing Shift

For nearly three years, Nursing student Aubrey Sertterh has worked at The Nebraska Medical Center as a patient care technician on the second floor in Pre-Op/PACU. No two days on the job are ever the same, but some days are slightly more strange (and unforeseen) than others

At 21 years old, Sertterh had never met her biological father. All she knew of him was his name and that he was half Irish. Then, on July 3, 2012, something unexpected happened. "I was working in the extended stay area of my department and the phone rang," she said. The secretary was not at the desk, so Sertterh answered. She was told a patient named Don Parmenter was on his way to the Pre-Op/PACU. "I felt my heart stop and my stomach drop," Sertterh said "I could not believe what I had just heard, and, for a brief second, I was speechless." Don Parmenter was the name of Sertterh's biological father.

Immediately, Sertterh looked down at the procedure schedule on the desk in front of her and saw that the patient was 84 years old, which didn't add up. At that point, it was time for her to clock out, but she couldn't leave for the day without knowing more about the patient with her father's name.

"He ended up going to PACU/Recovery first instead of coming straight to extended stay, so I walked by the spot he was in just to get a look at him," she explained. "I was so nervous

and scared, but I really want to go and talk to him. I told a couple of my co-workers about what was going on, and they helped me build up the courage to go speak to him." So, Sertterh went into the locker room where patient belongings are stored, picked up the bag labeled "Don Parmenter" and made her way into his room.

Sertterh: Hi. Do you know any other Don Parmenters?

Parmenter: Yes, my son. Do you know him? Sertterh: No, not really, but I think he dated my mom.

Parmenter: Oh really? What's your mom's name?

Sertterh told him her mother's name and age. Parmenter then asked, "Well what's your dad's name?" Sertterh's eyes began to swell. Without her saying a word, Parmenter realized who she was to him and who he was to her.

The newly united grandfather and granddaughter spent some time getting acquainted with one another. Sertterh learned she had an 18-year-old half-brother named Gage who just graduated high school. A nurse came in to take their photo, and then it was time for Parmenter to make his way to extended stay. Sertterh escorted him down the hall, and that was when she met her uncle, Ron, who was in disbelief when he learned about Sertterh's connection to his family. "Then, we exchanged our goodbyes and said we would keep in touch," she said.

About a month later, Sertterh and her fiancé took a trip to Gering, Neb. to visit Parmenter and meet more of her long-lost relatives. "I met Gage (half-brother), Donnie (biological father), Barbara (great aunt) and my grandma," she said. "They told me that I have a lot of family now (about 130 first-, second- and third-cousins), most of whom live in or around Gering. Everyone was very nice and accepting of me into the family."

Just a couple of weeks ago, Sertterh made another trip to Gering over Spring Break. "My grandpa is now 85 years old and still rides

horses, so he and I went on a two-hour long horseback ride together." She was able to meet more family members during a dinner outing and also found out she has two halfsisters. One is about 30 years old and lives in Montana; the other is 22 and lives in Lincoln, Neb.

"Growing up I had always thought about meeting my biological father/family, but I never thought that it would happen the way that it did," commented Sertterh. "I am very grateful to have my wonderful mom, Layna, and the most amazing dad, Martin, who took me in as his own when I was born and adopted me when I was 2-and-a-half years old. I feel very blessed that I finally got to meet the other half of my blood-related family and am very happy with the way that it happened. Looking back at how my life has gone so far, I wouldn't change one thing about it."

DNP & Ed.D. Programs Approved

First classes begin this fall; Enrolling students now

After more than two years of research, countless late-night and weekend planning sessions and a site visit from the Higher Learning Commission last August, the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) and Doctor in Health Care Education and Leadership (Ed.D.) programs are now officially a part of the academic nomenclature at Clarkson College.

The College first received word of the accreditation announcement on Dec. 6 in a letter from HLC addressed to Dr. Burgher. For the administrative and directorial personnel involved in the operational measures taken to develop and propose the programs, this accomplishment is a commendable new mention on their lists of accolades.

"Attaining this status is a direct reflection of administrative support and faculty diligence," said Dr. Pat Coyle-Rogers, Director of Graduate Nursing. "Being able to offer degrees at the Doctoral level is a natural progression of our nationally recognized graduate nursing programs."

The 39-credit hour DNP program addresses contemporary aspects of expert clinical practice and offers in-depth knowledge on

leadership, health care systems design and evaluation, evidence-based practice and applied research. The 45-credit hour Ed.D. program offers students a foundation in outcomes assessment, learning theories, curriculum and program development, transformational leadership and research to strengthen the ability to implement innovative educational approaches. Both programs are offered entirely online with part- and full-time options available.

"We are approaching these new offerings in a conservative and thoughtful manner," stated Dr. Burgher. "Two years of research has shown us there is a demand for these programs. Our numbers will remain small as we focus on quality in the near future."

New Program: Long Term Care Administration Certificate

Beginning this fall, Clarkson College will offer a new certificate program for Long Term Care (LTC) Administration. This LTC Administration Certificate will provide students with the educational knowledge to take the Nursing Home Administrator Board Exam, as well as get started on the required 640 hours of practicum. The certificate will be 100 percent online and is comprised of 11 courses for a total of 32 credit hours.

The greatest aspect of the new certificate program is that it combines both clinical aspects—such as basic medical terminology and common disease processes associated with the elderly population—as well as the administrative aspects of LTC—such as finance, management and human resources. A student will be able to obtain the LTC Administrator Certificate in as little as one year.

Born in Liberia and amidst the turmoil brought on by civil war, Reuben and his family migrated to the U.S. in 2000 through a political asylum program offered by the Catholic Social Services. They were situated in Hastings, Neb., the place Reuben considers home and where he remained through and beyond his high school graduation.

When the time came to explore colleges, Reuben knew a career in health and fitness was the track for him. A close friend of his was enrolled in the Physical Therapy program at Creighton University and encouraged Reuben to apply. When Reuben said it was important to him to be hands-on and client-facing, his friend suggested he look into the PTA program at Clarkson College. After researching the program, Reuben knew it was

the right fit, and he enrolled in August 2011.

Approaching his final semester in the program, Reuben says he predicts a long and successful future as a practicing PTA. "I want to help people, and I love to see the results of my work," he comments. "I love to motivate and encourage people, especially during a difficult time of recovery."

Currently, Reuben is an assistant manager at Famous Footwear in Lincoln and also works as a Health Screener for Health Fitness where he visits area companies and checks employees' blood pressure, body mass index, glucose and cholesterol levels. For employees with abnormal results, Reuben consults them on what they can do to improve their condition.

Upon graduation and passing the PTA board examination, Reuben hopes to find a job somewhere in the northern region of Colorado.
