wife, Meliora knew the importance of innovation and excellence when they opened Clarkson Memorial Hospital and accepted its first nursing student in 1888. Clarkson College has never lost that innovative spirit over the many years since its opening. As a threetime graduate of Clarkson College and now an instructor within the Radiography and Medical Imaging program, I have been immersed in the innovation and new technologies around the College campus for several years.

One of many reasons I chose to attend the Clarkson College Radiography and Medical Imaging program was because of their lab spaces featuring technology that allowed me to feel prepared when going out to my first clinical rotation. Fast forward to my time spent at

Clarkson College as an instructor. Within the Radiography program, we still maintain two updated lab spaces for our students to practice procedures. Two new spaces, the new Interactive Learning Center and Interprofessional Learning Center, allow our students a more interactive and meaningful learning experience.

The Interactive Learning Center houses items that I utilize heavily in the Radiography Procedures courses and Cross-Sectional Anatomy courses taught on campus. The Anatomage Tables have many capabilities that allow students to view four different real human cadavers that have been dissected and placed in electronic files on the table. I have been utilizing the Multitaction Wall to further my students' understanding of key anatomy with interactive 3D models that they have the capability to rotate and visualize from numerous directions. Both technologies have the capabilities for students to interact with them remotely, so our online courses may utilize them as

The Interprofessional Learning Center is an entire floor that has simulation and practice spaces including an operating room, medical/surgical inpatient room, maternal/fetal child room, other inpatient bays, and clinic exam rooms. One of my favorite spaces is the operating room, which is odd to admit, considering how fearful I was of the operating room as a student years ago. I know if this space would have been available while I was a student at Clarkson College, my fear



of the operating room would have been diminished drastically. Having the opportunity to engage in a learning environment that is so close to what a student experiences out in the clinical field has proven to be so beneficial to our students.

The Interactive and Interprofessional Learning Centers demonstrate that the innovative spirits of Bishop Clarkson and Meliora have continued. Health care systems and patients across the United States will continue to reap the benefits of these innovations as more and more individuals become prepared alumni, like yourselves, of Clarkson College.

found a way to combine her passion for pharmaceutical and community health care, and the Clarkson College Bachelor of Science in Community Health degree option helped her get there.

"I have always been a pharmacy technician," she says. "But with the role I am in today, the education I received through Clarkson College has given me the opportunity to make an impact in the community."

Diamond currently works at Nebraska Medicine as a Community Based Pharmacy Operations Manager. One of her primary roles is to help expand pharmacy services to patients with medication access barriers. Both her background as a pharmacy technician and her experiences in the Community Health program allow her to achieve this task.

Diamond had the opportunity to work with organizations such as United Way of the Midlands, Red

Cross, Munroe-Meyer Institute and Hope Lodge during her fieldwork and service requirements for the program. These experiences reinforced her dedication to serving others, and she draws on them in her current role.

"The experiences solidified my passion for helping others," she says. "If I can make it possible for someone to receive a lifesaving medication that they would otherwise not have access to, it is motivation to keep going and promotes innovation and courage within myself to continue to expand services that benefit the community."

Because the Community Health program curriculum covers topics such as health policy and patient advocacy, environmental and cultural influences on health care, and legal and ethical implications, it can help individuals succeed in a variety of fields. For Diamond, it opened the door to making changes within her community and serving patients.

"As a health care professional, understanding the different aspects of community health has allowed me to spread my knowledge and understanding of the needs in our community to others through every personal and professional interaction," she says.

Alumnus Finds His Calling as a Trusted Advocate for Sexual Assault Victims

WHEN A VICTIM OF SEXUAL

assault arrives at a Nebraska Medicine hospital, having a trusted, trained advocate waiting for them can make a world of difference.

Nebraska Medicine now has more nurses trained to care for these victims, with plans to add even more. Kalen Knight ('16) became the first nurse supervisor dedicated to the SANE (Sexual Assault Nurses Examiner) program in April.

"We historically have employed 11 SANE nurses, we currently have 18 with the goal of getting to 30," Knight says.

SANE nurses are trained in forensics. Their training teaches them how to care for victims of sexual assault, walk them through their options and collect evidence, if the victim consents.

"SANE nurses are taught on how to collect evidence, take photographs and how to conduct an interview using a trauma-informed approach," says Knight.

This technique is incredibly important as this information must be performed in a standardized way in order to be allowed into court evidence, if a victim decides to do that. A key part of that involves collecting the evidence within five days of the assault, and maintaining



chain of custody, according to Knight. The nurses are also experts in mandatory reporting laws, and can explain to the victim their four options in Nebraska:

- > Provide a full report with law enforcement and identify as a victim
- > Provide a partial report, which involves identifying as a victim but not involving law enforcement
- > Provide an anonymous report, where a SANE nurse collects evidence, but law enforcement is not involved. A victim has 20 years to decide if they want to press charges
- > Request medical treatment only, where the victim is treated for any injuries and potential sexually transmitted infections

"We are the bridge between health care and the legal system," explains Knight.

This past year, the increased staffing of SANE nurses allowed Nebraska Medicine to offer this expert care at Bellevue Medical Center and through telehealth to Mary Lanning Hospital in Hastings, Nebraska, in April and Faith Regional Hospital in Norfolk, Nebraska, late last year. Using telehealth, a SANE nurse will consult with the patient's primary nurse and also speak to the patient through a video monitor to conduct an interview and explain reporting options.

"If a patient consents, we will talk the nurse through evidence collection," he says.

By this fall, Knight expects to offer 24/7 SANE nurse coverage. The program also plans to respond to victims of domestic violence, intimate partner violence, human trafficking and elder abuse once staffing reaches 30 nurses.

"Sexual assault victims are in a very sensitive state after experiencing a trauma like this," says Knight. "Our SANE nurses work with them one-on-one to give them their autonomy back after their right to choose was taken from them. We want to do

everything we can to care for them, but to also ensure the best outcome in case they decide to pursue legal options."

"It's vital we have 24-hour SANE coverage because when our sexual assault patients present to the Emergency Department, they are in absolute crisis," says Cynthia Hernandez, MD, Emergency Medicine and medical director of SANE. "The last thing they should worry about is receiving anything less than extraordinary and compassionate medical care. Our SANEs are highly educated and able to provide emotional support to this unique set of patients. They are trained to collect forensic evidence, which is instrumental in the prosecution of violent sexual crimes in our community. I am incredibly proud of our team and the work they do each and every day."

Distance Learning Makes Pursuing a Medical Imaging Degree Possible



DISTANCE LEARNING

is becoming more and more accessible at higher education institutions, but Clarkson College has been a leader in the arena for decades. Leigh Cooper, BSMI, RT(R)(VI)(ARRT) ('21), recently completed her Bachelor's degree in Medical Imaging as well as Certificate in Medical Imaging Informatics, both from the comfort of her home in Alabama.

As a mother and full-time working professional, Cooper needed a program that offered flexibility and supportive faculty. When she began searching for programs to meet her needs, Clarkson College seemed like the right fit. "I wanted a tough school that was willing to push me to become a better radiology technologist and help me keep my integrity toward myself and others," she says. "I received that and so much more at Clarkson College."

Before she enrolled in her programs, Cooper participated in the self-paced courses the College offers to help technologists achieve their American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) certifications. In July 2021, Cooper received her licensure in Vascular Intervention. Both her certification as well as her degree and certificate are vital for her professional role as a radiologic technologist at a sports medicine clinic in Alabama.

Cooper often sees as many as 50 patients a day through her work as she assists doctors and physician assistants with their imaging needs. According to her, the key components of being a health care worker are patience, kindness and a servant's heart—all three of which were reflected in her studies at Clarkson College and guide her in her day-to-day role.

"Having worked in a few different parts of the radiology and medical imaging fields, I can honestly say the most rewarding thing is being able to help patients," she says. "Whether I am helping take their socks and shoes off, holding their hand and comforting them when in pain, or laughing with them, I'm helping them in some aspect."

Having completed her Bachelor's degree, Cooper hopes to continue on to earn her Master's degree and get one step closer to her goal of teaching. When the time comes, she'll be looking to Clarkson College to continue her education. "From the moment I communicated with someone at the College, to the professors, and everyone in between, I felt like they cared every bit about my success," she says.

"I may not have ever stepped foot on that campus in Omaha, but I sure felt like I was part of the school."





3D Printing and Training **Center Offers Medical** 3D Print Services to Community

IN JULY, CLARKSON COLLEGE LAUNCHED THE 3D Printing and Training Center, the first-of-its-kind facility in the area that uses cutting-edge technology to provide 3D print visualizations to health care professionals and community members.

The Center supports a commitment to excellence in learning by creating pathways to utilize 3D print and visualization as a language in health care. The facility offers multiple methods including the creation of 3D models using medical scans such as MRIs and CTs, as well as interactive virtual models that can be accessed via a personal link. Prints and reconstructions can be ordered by medical professionals or community members, and all scans are reviewed by a committee of certified radiologists.

The facility is led by Blair Kauzlarich, B.S., RT(R), CI, an imaging specialist with more than a decade of experience in the radiology field and former Advanced Imaging Specialist in the Advanced 3D Visualization Lab at Children's Hospital and Medical Center in Omaha, Neb.

"Our mission is to ensure that anyone, regardless of background or experience, can understand and visualize what's happening to them and their loved ones in regard to their health," says Kauzlarich. "3D prints provide a tangible representation of everything from tumors to breaks in bones, making the language and understanding of health care more universal and providing individuals with a clear path forward."

Kauzlarich and her family have firsthand experience both with the uncertainness of a medical diagnosis and the benefits of 3D printing and visualization. In February 2022, Kauzlarich's 11-month-old son Callum was diagnosed with a choroid plexus papilloma, a rare brain tumor. Thankfully the tumor was benign, but it needed to be removed to relieve pressure in the brain causing hydrocephalus.

"A whirlwind of emotions come over you," she says. "Even being in the medical field and seeing these things every day, it's different when it's your child."

Utilizing her background in medical 3D printing and visualization, Kauzlarich, along with the radiologist she worked for at the time, were able to create an interactive virtual 3D model as well as a 3D print of the tumor and its location in the brain using her son's scans. This type of interface was crucial for helping her husband, Kyle, and their family understand exactly what was happening with Callum. "Looking at black and white images of an MRI may not be helpful to those who lack a medical background," she says. "These 3D images provided the knowledge and a language that our family could understand."

The scans were then provided to Callum's surgeon who successfully removed the tumor with no lasting side effects other than a scar. "There was a new light in our son – his eyes and expressions were totally different," says Kyle. "He had always been a sleepy kid, and we didn't realize why. He's so happy now."

Producing more outcomes like Callum's is just one of the facility's goals. Kauzlarich and her team also aim to offer training opportunities to help health care professionals who are in the medical field and are interested in 3D printing and visualization. The Center offers individuals enrolled in the Certificate in Medical 3D Printing Specialist through Clarkson College the opportunity to utilize printing equipment and models throughout their course of study.

organization dedicated to supporting military service members and future nurses, Clarkson College will be able to offer students more updated technology and equipment to help them prepare to provide the best in patient care.

James Miller and Bob Hill recently visited the College on behalf of Forty and Eight, an organization committed to charitable and patriotic aims with a purpose to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States, to promote the well-being of veterans, their widows, widowers, and orphans, and to actively participate in selected charitable endeavors, which include programs that promote child welfare and nurses training.

Miller, a long-time employee at Clarkson Hospital in Omaha before his retirement, recently received care from Jeffrey Downs, a current student enrolled in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) to Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program option at the College. Downs shared his experiences as a student at the institution, which prompted Miller to propose a donation to the school on behalf of Forty and Eight.

The donation will fund a patient cart and gurney as well as two Simulab Airwayman mannequins for the Interprofessional Learning Center, an ultrasound machine and trainer for the Nurse Anesthesia program, and partially fund a new and second Anatomage Table for the College.

"The donation from Forty and Eight makes it possible for our students to learn using the latest technology, which sets them apart in their field and allows them to provide patients with the best possible care," said Dr. Gary Pack, Interim President. "We are incredibly grateful for their support of our Mission and willingness to help train the next generation of health care workers."

Miller and Hill delivered the check to the College in May and had the opportunity to tour the institution and see how their donation would be used. During the tour, they viewed updated spaces including the

Interprofessional Learning Center and watched a demonstration from Dr. Ricardo Varguez, Director of the Center for Teaching Excellence, on the Anatomage Table, a fully segmented 3D anatomy system that students utilize to gain hands-on learning and experience.

Forty and Eight has a long history of supporting nurses. In previous years, the organization funded nursing scholarships and recently, they have supported local nursing schools by providing training equipment that prepares students to provide exceptional care to patients. Founded in 1920, the organization derives its name from the box cars used on French railways during World War I that were used to transport either 40 soldiers or eight horses during the war efforts.



Bringing Behavioral Health Care to Nebraska

The COVID-19 pandemic has made the disparities in access to health care, particularly behavioral health, starkly evident. Nebraska has its own challenges providing the care its residents need due to the lack of qualified providers in the state. Some health care and education institutions, however, are working toward minimizing the gaps in behavioral health by encouraging students to explore the behavioral health field.

According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), one in five Americans reports experiencing mental illness each year; that's 6.5 million people dealing with everything from schizophrenia to depression—and those are only the people who report their conditions. In Nebraska alone, more than 257,000 adults live with a mental health condition, and 22,000 children between the ages of 12 and 17 suffer from depression.

The numbers are staggering and unfortunately, there are not enough behavioral health providers to go around. The University of Nebraska Medical Center Behavioral Health Education Center of Nebraska (BHECN) reports that 88 counties in Nebraska have a shortage of mental health professionals, and 32 counties lack any type of behavioral health provider.

Mary Dishman, MSN, Director of Undergraduate Nursing at Clarkson College, is a current student studying to be a psychiatric-mental health nurse practitioner. "The most challenging part about practicing in mental health is the lack of care, especially in our underserved populations and rural areas," she says. "Patients should not have to wait four to six weeks or even months to be seen by a practitioner."

She says that the rise of telehealth has improved access to care, but to help address the root of the problem, more health care providers must enter the behavioral health field. Many first-time nurses and health care professionals believe the only places offering opportunities for mental health services are state-run facilities. According to the American Association of Nurse Practitioners, however, public health departments, addiction and treatment clinics, hospitals, correctional



facilities, private practices, and community organizations all have a need for qualified mental health practitioners.

Some organizations are trying to do something about the shortage. Clarkson College recently hosted a recruiting event for students enrolled in their Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program option. The gathering focused on the Psychiatric Mental-Health Nurse Practitioner option the institution offers that allows students to earn their Master of Science in Nursing and become certified mental health nurse practitioners.

"We want students to know, even before they graduate, that there are numerous options within the behavioral health field for them," says Jen Wilson, Academic Support Administrator at Clarkson College.

Wilson helped organize the event, which featured students like Dishman who are currently enrolled in the Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurse Practitioner option, as well as faculty who teach in the program and practice in the field. "Hearing from nurses who are practicing in the mental health field allows students to see firsthand the impact behavioral health providers can have on patients and communities," says Wilson.

"The most rewarding part of practicing in a mental health setting is getting to help patients not only feel better, but also to have hope," says Dishman. "I know that I will not help every patient who walks into my office, but even if I can help them with small changes, that is a win"



Two New Scholarships Offer **Opportunities for Students**

Clarkson College Signs Articulation Agreement with Metropolitan Community College

Partnership allows students with an associate degree to transfer existing credit to Clarkson College to continue their education

Clarkson College and Metropolitan
Community College (MCC) recently signed an articulation agreement that allows MCC students earning an associate degree to transfer their existing credit to Clarkson College and enroll in one of the institution's health care program options.

"Both Metropolitan Community College and Clarkson College are committed to expanding educational opportunities for students," says Dr. Gary Pack, Interim President of Clarkson College. "This new relationship ensures a smooth transition for students who wish to enter the health care field and prepare to provide compassionate, high quality care."

Students who have received an associate degree at MCC are required to have maintained a 2.5 grade point average to be eligible to transfer courses. They must also have maintained a "C" average in courses that are to be transferred. Individuals who meet the admissions criteria are automatically

accepted into online program options at Clarkson College, and those applying to on-campus program options receive preference through additional points on their application. Once accepted at Clarkson College, students have the opportunity to take advantage of online and on-campus services including tutoring, mentoring, supplemental instruction, writing labs and career services.

Students can apply their college credit to one of the numerous health care degree options, including two new options in Community Health, Pre-Health Professional (Pre-Med, Pre-Dentistry, Physical Therapy, Physician Assistant, Occupational Therapy and Pre-Pharmacy) as well as Psychology, at Clarkson College. The institution also offers additional certificate, associate, bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree options in Nursing (BSN, RN to BSN and MSN), Physical Therapist Assistant, Radiography and Medical Imaging, Community Health, Education and Leadership, Healthcare Business, and Health Information Management.
